Honourable Members we can now observe a moment of silent/prayer and meditation. You may get seated. We are proceeding, next item. Honourable Mokaila we have made an attempt yesterday to attend to this situation; we are proceeding to attend to this. Please my apology Honourable Gerber. Can we then proceed to the next item?

MINUTES OF THE 3RD JUNE  
2008**

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Members I put before you a set of minutes for adoption of the 3rd June 2008.

Are there any corrections from the minutes, ntate Tselapedi and ntate Vilakazi we are now at a stage where we want corrections from the minutes? In the absence of any corrections does the House adopts the minutes? Next item.

**SECRETARY: ITEM NO.3  
MOTIONS**

- a) Motions without notice**
- b) Notices of motions**

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Members are there any motions without notice, Honourable Groenewald.

**HON. GROENEWALD:**

Thank you Honourable Deputy Chair, the DA wishes to register this concern about ongoing violence in Khutsong which is now affecting and derailing school exams. It has been three weeks since schooling has been dis-

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rupted and culminated and burning down of classes on Monday the 9th of June 2008, by group of students who are members of COSAS. The pupils were then send home. After the incident cases of arson and malicious damage to property has been opened.

We call on the parents and the community of Khutsong to help curb violence and encourage pupil to attend school and complete their exams. The DA is very concerned about this situation and ask for immediately and drastic action to be taken by the Department of Education to stop this violence. I thank you.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Does the House adopt the motion? Is the House saying yes? Ntate Moruti.

**HON. MEC TSELAPEDI:**

Deputy Speaker, I think we really welcome the motion of the Honourable Member however, as he says they are calling upon the Department of Education to stop the violence, is that possible? Maybe he wanted to speak about the Department of Safety and Security and I don't think it is upon the Department of

Education in the province to can stop the violence in Khutsong.

**HON. GROENEWALD:**

Thank you Honourable Deputy Speaker, yes we ask for the department to stop the violence because most of the violence is in the school situation. The burning down of classes yesterday is in the school and that is why we are asking the department to take action in the schools and maybe help intervene with the teachers and children. Thank you.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Do we, having had clarity to the last part of the motion, adopt the motion? Honourable Tselapedi.

**HON. MEC TSELAPEDI:**

I would rather advise my colleague to come with an amendment that says they call on all the stakeholders including the Department of Education to intervene. If it is like that I really agree. But I cannot see how we can agree that Department of Education can stop violence. I don't know how I can extensionally through to that one but if you are called upon to intervene together with other stakehold-

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ers, that one I can but the one that says we as the Department of Education must stop violence it needs some debate.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

My reading is that Honourable Tselapedi's view on this motion is not very far from what Honourable Groenewald was saying when you say stakeholders coming together to attend to the situation. Honourable Groenewald.

**HON. GROENEWALD:**

Thank you Honourable Deputy Chair I will accept the amendment, thank you.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Do we adopt the motion? Ntate Vilakazi do you adopt the motion?

**HON. MEC VILAKAZI:**

No I also want the motion to reflect that the police have actually acted on that situation including yesterday's one so that there should be due recognition that there has not lapse of law enforcement but we must acknowledge that when students are in a school and they start activities there in the school you can't have a police

officer at every door of the classroom anticipating that students are going to be unhappy. But where there has been violent activities including yesterday's one the police deployed in the area have been able to deal with that situation albeit at the time when it had escalated. I'm just worried that the motion should not suggest that there has not been some stakeholders responsible ...[INTERUPTION BY HON HATTINGH].

**HON. HATTINGH:**

Honourable Deputy Speaker a point of order.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Just before point of order Honourable Hattingh I will give you time to speak. In fact I wanted Honourable Vilakazi to complete because Honourable Vilakazi brings into the motion of Honourable Groenewald something that was not in the motion.

**HON. HATTINGH:**

Point of order, this is a motion without notice, it is not to be debated, if it is going to be debated is going to be converted to a motion with notice and it may be debated in terms of my Rules.

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**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Ntate Vilakazi iketle. Honourable Groenewald places a motion without notice, ntate Tselapedi speaks on the motion, there was an area where ntate Tselapedi was not comfortable particularly towards the end of the motion. Ntate Tselapedi proposes an amendment Honourable Groenewald agrees to the amendments to say stakeholders must join hands in addressing the situation that is where the motion stops.

There has never been a suggestion Honourable Vilakazi with all due respect in Honourable Groenewald' s motion that the police has not been doing anything nor has any area of the motion suggests that the police has not been doing anything. I think that is a separate matter, this is what I was trying to avoid that it must not be brought into the motion because it is not there. We close this motion by saying stakeholders to join hands in addressing the situation in Khutsong, do we agree? [AGREED]. Honourable Mampane.

**HON. MAMPANE:**

Thank you Honourable Deputy

Speaker, I hope this motion will cover Honourable Member. The ANC rises to place a motion without notice to inform your House about the burning of Badirile High School in Merafong. On Monday 9th June 2008 allegedly a group of people set a classroom and store-room alight after expressing their dissatisfaction over the examination timetable. All the pupils were send home and a case of arson and malicious to damage to property was opened. It is not known which people started the fire and no one has been arrested. As the ANC we urge the police to swiftly arrest the perpetrators of this crime we also call upon the community of Khutsong and the ANC structures, that is all stakeholders in that area to assist the police by reporting suspects and to further establish the street communities and community safety forum as part of the fight against crime in their community. I thank you.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Members do we agree with the motion? Honourable Hattingh.

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**HON. HATTINGH:**

Honourable Deputy Speaker a motion without notice should be accepted by whole of the House the fact that this Member isolates one political party makes it unacceptable and I oppose it.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Mampane Honourable Hattingh says your motion without notice contains an element that is debatable. You see I have taken a decision that we have to be strict on Rules. In this instance there are two options available. It is either we adopt or not adopt the motion. Honourable Maloyi.

**HON. MALOYI:**

Deputy Speaker we just want to clarify something and after this clarity we will have to hear what Honourable Hattingh is saying. That motion says "the ANC calls upon," is he now saying that the ANC should not call upon he must say the ANC the DA, we can't speak on behalf of the other parties. That is why we are saying the ANC calls upon. If he is having a problem with that aspect that says "the ANC calls upon" because Mampane is a member of the ANC so she can't speak on their behalf. Is

that debatable?

**HON. HATTINGH:**

Honourable Deputy Speaker, I will refer you to the Rules which I believe you have studied. Motion without notice specifically (g) and it says "every motion requires notice except a motion in regard to which notice is dispensed with by the unanimous consent of all the Members present". If I can respond to the request but that may require debate and a motion without notice is not debatable here it must be debated in the further sitting. Therefore it must be converted if the Member still got that feeling for it, to a motion of a notice. The intention of motions without notice in this House was repeatedly expressed by the Speaker; it is more of general nature congratulations, sympathies' and things like that. Unfortunately recently it has been converted into another form of a motion, it is supposed to be general motions that could be supported to each and everybody and if it is debatable like it is indicated by Honourable Maloyi it should be converted to a notice of a motion.

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**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Members, you know because we are reading some Rules I'm also going to advice you to read Rule 90. It says a Member cannot stand up and speak until the presiding officer has recognized him to do it. Something that Honourable Hattingh does not observe, I want to go back to that motion that the Rule says if the entire House does not agree with the motion, the mover of the motion may convert that motion to notice of motion that is the route that I would want us to take. But I would also want to advice the House that we must read Rule 83, it is important Rule 90 and 83 maybe it will help us to get the proceeding very swift in this House. Do we adopt the motion? The motion is adopted. Can we proceed?

**HON. HATTINGH:**

Deputy Speaker, there is an objection to the second motion it cannot be adopted. Unfortunately against your ruling it cannot be adopted and then you call for the adoption of motions, it is unacceptable it cannot happen that way.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Members, I want to draw your attention that today in this House we have two motions without notice. When Honourable Groenewald stands up he says the DA calls upon, that motion was adopted. He did not include other parties, now it cannot be correct that when other members stands up and say the ANC calls upon we reject the motion on that basis because we have accepted the first motion that says the DA says. Now you can't reject the motion on the basis that the ANC says when you have just adopted the motion that says the DA says.

In the light of the background that I have given, we are left now with one option to divide the House on the matter and check how many people are saying we adopt the motion and how many are saying we are not adopting the motion.

**HON. HATTINGH:**

Honourable Deputy Speaker point of order. You are handling once again the motion without notice if it is a motion that was public given notice for. This is in conflict with Rules of this House. No matter how you

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want to explain what happened in the first motion without notice which was also handed illegally in terms of the Rules for which I tried to have raised a point of order which you didn't want to listen to, a motion without notice and I want to repeat it apparently I was not heard on the first time when I said it, it is a general motions of congratulations ...  
[INTERUPTION BY DEPUTY SPEAKER]

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Hattingh with all due respect, speak on the motion don't speak on general motions because all Members understand what the purpose of motions is. Don't brief us about that all of us knows.

**HON. HATTINGH:**

Apparently not all of us know that, the fact is a motion without notice is not to be debated in the House. A motion that needs to be debated you need to give notice for and is then debated at the next sitting of this House, that is the point that I was trying to make when you are apparently on disagreement with me and now my understanding of the Rules and also the Speaker's understanding of the Rules and

the implementation of Rules in the House on the past. You cannot debate a motion that has been put in this House without notice which you are allowing to be debated.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Maloyi and Honourable Madoda.

**HON. MALOYI:**

Deputy Speaker Honourable Hatting is right that if there is anybody in the House who objects to a motion without notice we can do two things, it is either we reject the motion or we convert that motion into a notice of a motion. So we can't vote, and on that aspect he is right and I hope that he understand the implication of his objection. And in that case I think we must then find out from the proposer whether she would want to convert it or what we do about it.

**HON. MADODA:**

Chair I agree with the Chief Whip but I'm just perturbed that the motion doesn't have in my view any debatable aspect and therefore maybe we need to persuade Honourable Hattingh in future that it shouldn't be a

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party to party thing that we begin to fight the way he is doing it now. Thank you.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

You know earlier on Honourable Members I said I have decided to be strict on Rules and I said if a motion is tabled is either we adopt the motion or we convert that motion into a notice of motion. Honourable Mampane do you want to convert your motion into a notice of motion?

**HON. MAMPANE:**

No Honourable Deputy Speaker.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

If we can't agree Honourable Members I'm now taking a ruling here. This motion will be converted into a notice of motion because I can see that Members got interest of debating the motion so that we open a debate on it. Honourable Hattingh please sit down. Honourable Vilakazi.

**HON. MEC VILAKAZI:**

Honourable Deputy Speaker I think Honourable Madoda had a point, the motion says the ANC and it refers to other stakeholders. Now is Honourable Hattingh objecting to be called

other stakeholders because that is what in the context of the motion? So if you say he has not been referred to, that part captures him but is his objection that he should not be referred to as a stakeholder because the motion is very clear, the proposer is the ANC and it says other stakeholders, this motion is so good the only debatable aspect in as far as I'm concerned is whether Honourable Hattingh wants to be called by name or he wants to be referred to as other stakeholders. If that is the clarity he wants, then I think Honourable Mampane's proposal that we can't refer to Honourable Hattingh in name in our own proposed what's name, it is right because they have never done it from their benches, they have never said the DA and the ANC they always say the DA proposes that we accept the motion without notice blaa blaa blaa.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Vilakazi and I know I say I take a ruling on this matter. I can see that Members are keen to interest to debate the motion. I say this motion must be converted into a notice of motion so that Members can

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participate in the debate and this matter is closed. Honourable Duma, I'm coming to you Honourable Hattingh.

**HON. HATTINGH:**

Honourable Deputy Speaker, you said you will turn to me now you bypass me again.

**HON. MEC DUMA:**

I think we should agree with the ruling of the presiding officer and not argue with the presiding officer.

**HON. HATTINGH:**

I think the point is now made by Honourable Maloyi and Honourable Madoda that motions without notice should not contain debatable points. I don't know whether I heard very correctly but in the spirit conveyed here and specifically with what is addressed I'm prepared to withdraw my objection. Now it say what I heard is that there is a call on ANC structures that is what I heard I don't know whether that is correct, if that is a call on ANC structures that is insensitive it should be on all structures because this House cannot it becomes a motion of this House and it cannot call on the structures of the specific

party to do something.

That was my objection, if I heard incorrectly if its incorrectly phrased I'm prepared to withdraw and support that motion but not that this House call on a specific party structure to do anything. I don't know whether I heard I've heard whether it was perhaps phrasing that or whether I heard incorrectly but if it is on that basis and that understanding I'm prepared to withdraw the objection. Thank you.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Mampane a o ntse o reeditse Honourable Hattingh? I doubt, can you respond to that there is clarity he is seeking if you have been listening.

**HON. MAMPANE:**

Honourable Deputy Speaker I said and other stakeholder.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

In the light of that explanation Honourable Hattingh is withdrawing and the motion is adopted. Can we proceed? Is there any notice of motion? None. Can we proceed to the next item?

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**SECRETARY: ITEM NO.4

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

I refer Honourable Members to the question paper. Question 1 is the question tabled for the first time needs a written reply. It's a question of Honourable Hattingh to Member of Executive Council responsible for Transport, Roads and Public Safety.

**HON. MEC VILAKAZI:**

I will respond to the question at the second sitting it is tabled for the first time.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Members we are proceeding to question 2 on the question paper, Honourable Groenewald questioned Member of the Executive Council responsible for Local Government and Housing.

**HON. MEC VILAKAZI:**

I so table the response.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

We proceed to question 3, a question of Honourable Groenewald to MEC Education.

**HON. MEC TSELAPEDI:**

E tla sekegwa mo nakong e e tlang mong wame.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Question 4, Honourable Groenewald to Education again.

**HON. MEC TSELAPEDI:**

Le yona e tla sekegwa mo nakong e e tlang.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Question 5 is tabled for the third time Honourable Groenewald to MEC Local Government and Housing.

**HON. MEC VILAKAZI:**

Honourable Deputy Speaker I seek your indulgence the question I was referring to the first one about finances of Ditsobotla that one will be tabled at the next sitting this one that is asked about Sannieshof and Tswaing is the one that I'm tabling. I seek the House's indulgence to deviate from that other question and table it here that other one will be tabled in the next sitting.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Tabling an answer to question 5.

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**HON. MEC VILAKAZI:**

As it pleases you your worship.

Thank you Honourable Deputy Speaker, in a time where South Africa is beleaguered with unprecedented xenophobic attacks and the long lasting effects of it, from which the North West Province also did not escape, it is required from responsible leadership to convey a strong message against xenophobia obviously the same goes for racism.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Members there is a question of Honourable Hattingh asked for a Member of the Executive Council responsible for Local Government and Housing that is question 080520/W29.

**HON. MEC TSELAPEDI:**

Ke e mong wa me ke a e sekega mo boemong jwa ga rre Yawa.

In the North West Province recently the Premier as well as the MEC for Transport, Roads and Community Safety, MEC Phenye Vilakazi, displayed this leadership in addressing the outrageous racist public incitement after the Skielik incident. On the other end of the scale, generic statements accusing certain unidentified individuals and groups of racism and xenophobia causes polarization and should be identified for what it is this is nothing more than a racist or xenophobic expression of what is either harboured within or a deliberate expression of written or unwritten policy soaked with xenophobia or racism. Statements such as these tend to become the seeds that will grow and the harvest will be more xenophobia and

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

The local government one?

**HON. MEC TSELAPEDI:**

E ya bofelo e.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Thanks Honourable Members, this brings us to the end of interpellations and questions. We are proceeding to the next item.

**SECRETARY: ITEM NO.5  
STATEMENTS BY MEMBERS**

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Member's statements, Honourable Hattingh.

**HON. HATTINGH:**

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racism.

Sometimes these statements come disguised as a Trojan horse in luring people to read the racist message contained within. Such a despicable statement was recently published on the front page of the Mail and I want to quote: "Calling for unity among South Africans (this is the Trojan Horse part) Maloyi said that there were still small groups and individuals who practiced racism. Stressing the need for tolerance and acceptance of all races in the country, he called on all whites to condemn racism." He continued "some of our white farmers must stop ill-treatment of farm labourers".

When will the same person call on, and reluctantly I am using his same racist terminology, blacks to condemn racism, or on coloureds or Indian or Pakistanis or whoever?. In isolating the white community as a apparently the only group capable of racism and farmers as solely being responsible for the ill-treatment of labourers he sowed the seed of racism. It is more likely than not that when racist and farm attacks happen

in future when these seeds come to fruition the same person will be silent somewhere in the dark and smoke filled room planning another assault on the minds of susceptible people.

The DA condemns all forms of racism whether it is verbal or physical or any other way or even when it becomes disguised as a Trojan horse. I thank you.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Members there is a statement, is there any Member who wish to debate the statement? Honourable Maloyi.

**HON. MALOYI:**

Deputy Speaker we appreciate the statement from Honourable Hattingh for indicating to this House that the DA like the ANC is calling on everybody in South Africa to condemn acts of xenophobia, racism and other related intolerances, we appreciate that. But, at the same time I don't know where Honourable Hattingh gets the power or this oomph to poo-poo the African National Congress and the leader of the African National Congress. If he decides to read the Mail and have a belief that on the basis of a small quote of

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the Mail is what the chairperson of the ANC said without reading the whole context, then it is a problem because in South Africa what we expect of leaders, we expect leaders to read in full each and every statement, we expect leaders not to depend on the media in terms of what other leaders have said because if you do so you will then have a paper politics coming into this House.

Now Honourable Hattingh is very happy to at all times come to the House and debate what is contained in newspapers and so on and so forth without even having the audacity to investigate or check with whoever was speaking at that point in time, whether what is quoted in the newspaper is what he said and so on. But in anyway, we still think that what the chairperson of the ANC said in that statement is still correct to say that there are some elements within the white community and we are not apologetic about it, who are still harboring this feeling of racism and so on and so forth who are ill-treating the farm workers and we are not going to apologize on that matter, we are going to insist that those whites

must change, behave like South Africans. We are saying it is not all the whites in South Africa there are good whites in this country.

Now if Honourable Hattingh is going to say to this House and to the nation of this province that we should not condemn this element, then it is wrong it means he is the one who is harbouring this racist feelings because at all times because we must understand where does this man come from or this Honourable Member comes from because I don't think that he is happy seeing that in this country we are moving forward, in this country we are condemning all these acts and so, he is not happy about that because I believe that he is part of the tiny minority who still believe that South Africa does not belong to all who live in it. And in the ANC we believe that South Africa belongs to all who live in it and we will condemn everybody irrespective of the colour of his skin and so on. And if at any given stage we did not mention other people what he must do as a leader in this country is to add this other things which he is talking about because we

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cannot speak on his behalf we are speaking on our own behalf, so he must also speak on his own behalf and so on.

But in anyway we understand that that is the manner in which the DA operates because they believe that the opposition in this country is to oppose each and every thing which is said by the ANC and this government which is led by the ANC and nothing else. He does not know what is meant by constructive opposition by an opposition which is chaired towards building this nation.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Is there any other Member who would want to speak on the statement? Honourable Mokaila, Honourable Mangqo and Honourable Moiloa.

**HON. MOKAILA:**

Honourable Deputy Speaker thanks you very much. 1994 did not resolve South Africa's national question. It is an ongoing battle to deal with the effort of creating a one united none racial South Africa and that effort I think is for all of us. It is not possible that there could be resistance for a none racial

South Africa from black people necessarily or Africans in majority because they have not presided over apartheid and have not presided over racism in this country. The history of this country needs 300 unfortunately such that apartheid and racism in particular was presided upon by that particular race group. And if there is to be resistance for integration and racial harmony in this country ordinarily, it would come from pockets within the white community who have opposed to change since 1994. There has not been any documented case in this country where a black person has painted a white person with a silver paint or where a black person has dragged a white man on a tractor and therefore killed him or where a black person has killed and thrown a white person into a lion's den and therefore devoured by lions.

The history of this country needs 300 years to such that it is logical to expect resistance for racial integration and non racialism from the white community. The Chief Whip is right that there are still those segments within the whites and it is true

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that thumbs those consecutives have found home and refuse within the Democratic Alliance having taken the consecutive elements we did not want to joint the ANC from the national party upon its demise into the DA. And therefore, statements that comes from leaders of the DA for me indicates a refugee of some form within the DA of that element of white conservatism which continues to read racialism and anything that we say as the ANC and there is absolutely nothing racial in the comments made by the chairperson of the ANC. It actually paints a task for all of us for an evolving effort to create this none racial society that has underpinned the formation of the ANC since 1912 which have been opposed over years by parties such as the DA.

**HON. MEC MANGQO:**

Thanks Honourable Deputy Speaker I'm largely covered by the sentiments expressed by my two colleagues but I would probably call for or many we need a debate on what is racism post 1994 leading towards our developmental state so that we are able to elevate some of the characteristics that ordinarily we would want to shy away as ele-

ments that brings back those racist kind of activities. Maybe we need a very solid debate so that we don't understand it in a different way than the people that we need to move along with in building a united and a just South Africa. For my own understanding and probably all colleagues who would have to have a very formal debate on what is racism and what are the characteristics currently that we need to deal with in moving forward.

**HON. MOILOA:**

Thank you Deputy Speaker, indeed we can't run away from the fact that there are still pockets of racism in the province. Indeed to add what the colleagues have said it is only again in the North West where you still have the whites in particular in the farming area conniving with some of the white polices in the areas of Ventersdorp assaulting the black workers there and these are the things that demonstrate the attitude of the whites that we have. On the 6th of this very month we have a portfolio of the House, National Assembly conducting the public hearing in Ventersdorp.

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Honourable Deputy Speaker indeed the large number of whites were there sending very clear message, singing "Die Stem" regardless of the 14 years into a new order where we have all embraced the national anthem that unites all the ...[inaudible]... now you have that kind of a tendency. And it is in this context when as a leader speaks and should condemn racism right across because it is continuing, you experience it and indeed we can shy away from debating. At one point it had to be debated so that we confront these challenges and we are saying that the chairperson of the ANC was correct. Thank you.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Let me remind the House that this is a statement and it has been speaking on the statement, commenting on it as the Rule requires. It is not a debate. Honourable Mangqo proposes that at some stage we will have to have a broader debate on this question and because I see that Members are really interested in debating this matter I think Honourable Mangqo you need to formalize that request so that we come with that debate and

allow Members to engage in this exercise and clear up this issue. I think is at that time where every Member will be given sufficient time to debate. I must remind you again that this is a statement and after Honourable Members have spoken on a statement, the Rule does not allow me to revert back to you on a statement but let me give you an opportunity because I should not assume that he is going to speak on this statement or is something else.  
Honourable Hattingh

**HON. HATTINGH:**

Honourable Deputy Speaker, I have the history in this House under your chairmanship where you allow all other speakers and just allow me to speak I will not speak thank you.

**HON. DEP. SPEAKER:**

Honourable Members do we adopt the statement? [ADOPTED]. Next item.
